

COMMEMORATING 100 YEARS SINCE GALLIPOLI

To acknowledge this significant anniversary, a committee of representatives of Clare Regional History Group, Auburn & Clare Districts RSL Sub-branch members and Army Reservists is working hard to develop a display in the foyer and front rooms of the Clare Town Hall. The display will be opened on Monday 20th April and will be on view until Sat 2nd May. It will include photographs, uniforms, artillery, medals and other artefacts, with one room dedicated to a trench warfare recreation including light and sound effects. It is expected that the second week of the display, falling in the first week of Term 2, will be visited by many school groups.

A number of themes are being developed for the large display including life on the home front, circumstances leading up to the declaration of

war, its aftermath, and the role of local people ins specific theatres of

war. Communication between Europe and Australia will also be explored.

There will also be details and photos of the servicemen remembered on the Memorial Arch at the Clare Oval. Three of these men received fatal wounds on the Gallipoli Peninsula. The first of these men was Jack Adams (1891-1915) who enlisted in 1914 in the 10th Infantry Battalion and was killed while attempting to rescue the wounded. He was the son of Mrs Elizabeth Adams (nee Cheney) of Clare, and his brother Leo left for the front in 1916. Private Jack Adams is depicted in the photo on the right, while on leave in Egypt.

A Literary Competition has also been announced for entrants from Year 3 to adult. Selected entries will be on display and cash prizes awarded. Full details are given on page 4.

Local businesses are encouraged to become involved by arranging Anzac displays in their shop windows, and the History Group has a number of larger artefacts, such as framed portraits of servicemen, available on loan for incorporation in window displays. First choice will be offered to our

Corporate members who support the work of the Group through their annual subscription. More details are given on Page 4.

This year also marks 100 years since the opening of the Clare Drill Hall in Beare Street, and an interpretive plaque is planned for the site. Some history of the opening is reproduced from the pages of The Northern Arhus, on page 3.

SCHOOLS IN THE BLYTH AREA

Work continues to gather photos and research information relating to former schools close to Blyth. The schools in focus include Blyth Plains, Hart, Bowillia, Everard Central, Boucaut and Harmerville. While a number of photos have been obtained, there is still a lot to be unearthed to enable interpretive signs to be created to record the history and location of each of these sites.

This project has been proposed by Mr Jeff Pratt of Clare who believes it is crucial that this history is recorded while former students can contribute their knowledge. An excursion was conducted last spring to visit each site and determine the best place for each sign to be placed. A marker will also be placed adjacent to the Gleeson's Well water reserve as this was a crucial point of water supply in the early days.

Over the next few months the project will be publicised, offering an opportunity for former students to donate towards the cost of each sign. If you can help in this way or have history to share,

The Commonwealth Defence Department recently called tenders for a drill hall for Clare. Mr. P. McDougall was the successful tenderer, and will commence the work very shortly. The hall will be erected on land south of the Recreation Ground.

Opening of the Clare Drill Hall (News feature)

The newly erected drill hall at Clare will be officially opened on Wednesday afternoon next by the State Commandant, Colonel Irving, who will be accompanied to Clare by members of his staff. The Light Horse, infantry, and cadets of the Clare training area will be inspected by the Commandant, who will be given an official welcome by the Mayor (Mr. JW Ohlmeyer). Afternoon tea will be provided by Clare ladies, the proceeds of which will be given to the gymnasium fund for the hall. The drum and fife band of the Clare Public School will assist in the proceedings during the afternoon. In the evening an entertainment will be given at the Town Hall, under the patronage of Colonel Irving, by the Clare Vagabonds, assisted by a tableaux company from The Burra, and the Clare Orchestra, the proceeds of which will be given to a fund in aid of the Wattle Day Ambulance. Afterwards a dance will be held, the proceeds of which will be given to the gymnasium fund.

THE WHITES OF STANLEY FLAT

There were many families in the Clare area who had more than one member serving in World War I. The story of the children of Mrs Louisa White (nee Hart) of Stanley Flat) is of particular interest. Edward and Louisa White lived at Hallett during the years 1875 to 1892 when their thirteen children were born. Edward was the local school teacher. Three children died in infancy and are buried in the Hallett Cemetery.

After Edward's death in 1893, Louisa moved to 'Sutton Lea", Stanley Flat. At the time her youngest children, twins, were under one year. The family were reared to value education and travel very highly and this is evident in their chosen pursuits. Louisa's second youngest son, Gordon, attended school at Stanley Flat and as a young man moved to Western Australia. He was managing a store at Westonia when he

enlisted in a machine gun corps. His younger brother, Ray, was living in Canada when he enlisted and served as a stretcherbearer with the Canadian Rifles. Both sons were killed in action in France, Ray aged 22 in 1916, and Gordon aged 27 in 1917.



Soon after his death, Ray's twin sister Virginia also enlisted, serving in the Middle East with



the Australian Army Nursing Service. She had been Acting Sister at Kalgoorlie Hospital prior to enlisting, Virgina returned to Australia in 1919 and later worked as Matron of Streaky Bay Hospital for many vears.

She chose to donate her body to medical science and it is still providing education at the Flinders Medical Centre.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT TO THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD AT CLARE HOTEL, 21st AUGUST 2014

I have pleasure in presenting to you the 30th Annual Chairman's Report of the Clare Regional History Group.

As a small and active group you have once again given your time and energy freely over the past twelve months, accumulating some 1700 volunteer hours. 260 visitors came through our doors over the past 12 months attending to research. I would like to outline just some of the activities we have been associated with these past months.

Last October saw the final Historic Church Plaques unveiled at St. Paul's Lutheran Church, which was stage three of our History Markers project. Our thanks go to the Churches who contributed financially to this project.

In November, Robert Parker once again allowed us to use his historic home, 'Wolta Wolta' as a venue. This time we hosted members, corporate and life, to refreshments and later presented them with their certificates, followed by Robert conducting tours through this beautiful home and garden. Special thanks to Robert.

In April we celebrated the Clare Regional History Groups 30th birthday with another successful Show & Tell Dinner, following on from our successful 29th birthday celebrations. Once again a varied assortment of historical items came to the fore, allowing members to talk briefly about why the item was important to them.

A project also completed in April, was the research and collation, carried out by Helen, on the fallen WWII soldiers who enlisted from Clare. As always Helen put a lot of her time and energy into this project and was rewarded in seeing her work shown as a power point project at this year's ANZAC dawn service. As I said, Helen puts a lot of her time into the Group, as curator, treasurer, newsletter editor and numerous other tasks behind the scenes. On behalf of the Group, our thanks again to you Helen for all that you do.

As part of our input into History Month of May, the Group, in collaboration with the Clare/Auburn RSL, a plaque was unveiled at the Clare cemetery, detailing a brief history of the cemetery and the newly refurbished WW2 memorial Gates, which were relocated from the oval. Our opening times of the Collection were added into the History Month magazine and Helen ran a Master Class Workshop on the History Collection on all the Fridays during May.

We assisted Clare & Gilbert Valleys Council with suggestions about naming the car park in Mill Street and the small reserve in Berwick Street. This is valued collaboration between Council and the History Group.

One of our great resources is our photographic collection. We continue to receive requests from various individuals and organisations throughout the year seeking photos as well as information on a particular topic or person. Over the next 12 month period we will be assisting the Blyth and Stanley Flat communities with their specific projects.

Carol has been working away quietly at an index to The Northern Argus volumes since 1998, covering the period from 1937 to 1990. The Semple Index contains some 35,000 entries, arranged by surname. Proof-reading is now being undertaken on some of the four reference volumes. Carol hasn't quite finished with the Northern Argus yet, as she is now going through the card entries of the paper from 1990 and entering those on the computer which will be added to her index in due course. Well done Carol.

Jill continues to shut herself away in the back room, spending many hours, filming a variety of documents, books and official papers we are able to borrow from various community organisations throughout the midnorth. I'm sure this has been an onerous and at times a tiring task for Jill, turning pages and clicking the camera. Jill has shown great patience with this job which is a very important part of the Group's resources and we thank you Jill.

Val is another valued member, as she undertakes many of the research enquiries, with the assistance of Lyn, a capable researcher. Val is an efficient secretary and is great asset with her memory of people and connections with Clare.

Thanks also to Bill, our cataloguing expert, as he continues in this task with the ongoing acquisitions we gratefully receive. Thank you to Sue for contributions at meetings and if any publicity is required Sue is always at hand. Thank you also goes to Paul, as he is often able to resolve any issues or problems we have with the computers. To Win, who assists where she can and to Allison, who has audited our books for many years, thank you to you both.

I believe the location of the Clare Regional History Group will continue to be a challenge for us into the future. We are in the difficult position of having our Collection housed upstairs and this continues to be an access problem for some of the aged in our community as well as visitors and researchers to the Collection. Being located in an old stone building, temperature controlled and the size of our space is an ideal environment for our resources, but its location upstairs is a major issue. The possibility of installing a lift or perhaps relocate to the library precinct again would solve this problem. However, we are grateful to Council for the use of the Town Hall.

We are a small group of interested and dedicated volunteers and we should be justly proud of what we achieve throughout the year. We are an added attraction to Clare, bringing in many tourists who in turn stay and spend quality time in our district.

My thanks goes to you all, whether you help at the Collection, attend our meetings, assist at home, your opinions and suggestions are valued, you all play an important part of the History Group as we try to keep history alive in the Care Valley.

DUHIG THE BUILDER

While visiting cousins in Limerick last July, my sister and I noticed this headstone with an Australian connection. On closer examination, we learned the story of The Most Reverend Sir James Duhig, Archbishop of Brisbane for 48 years.

After his father's death in the 1870's the family were evicted from their land in Killeedy Parish, County Limerick. His mother, with six of her seven children emigrated to Australia.

Educated at St Joseph's College, Brisbane, James spent some time at the Cooperative Butchering Company before studying for the priesthood in Rome. He was ordained in 1896 at the age of 25 and his profile grew rapidly. In 1905 he became the youngest archbishop in the Catholic Church when he was ordained Bishop of Rockhampton. He was transferred to Brisbane in 1912 and became Archbishop of Brisbane in 1917, a position he held until his death in 1965.

In the early years his archdiocese took on an extensive building program, including churches, hospitals and schools, erecting more than 400 buildings and earning him the nickname "Duhig the builder". He played an active role in public life, favouring cooperation with the (largely Protestant) established order, and also contributed to the development of the University of Queensland, being a member of the University Senate from 1916 until his death. The Duhig Library was named after him. James Duhig was knighted (KCMG) in 1959. [Ed.]
